## Parable and Paradox



Parable and paradox - neither are quite what they seem. One, a fictitious story with an important hidden meaning; the other an absurd statement on first acquaintance, that becomes more understandable on further thought.

Jesus uses both. On one level he was talking to the crowd whilst training his disciples, (and us), to look beyond the obvious of what he was saying.

Para, a Greek prefix, can mean 'beyond', 'by the side of' as in paraphernalia and parenthesis, as well as parable and paradox. Phurra was a dowry that was due to the husband on marriage under Roman Law, but paraphernalia covered the woman's personal clothes and toilet things that would be uninteresting to a husband. They were things that 'ran alongside' and 'beyond' the dowry. But prefixes are fickle, for 'para' can have other meanings, such as: 'shelter from' as in parasol and parachute. As in many cases, a little knowledge is a dangerous thing.

Why does Jesus use parables and paradoxes? In their own right they are initially arresting and interesting and easily remembered. He is, however, anxious that we should learn to look beyond the obvious. He, Himself, is able to assess the inner man, a person's potential. Hospital scanners and x-rays can separate bones and organs from flesh, but we have only our senses to understand friend and stranger.

Perhaps by training ourselves to 'look beyond the obvious' and 'beyond', we shall glean a truer picture of a companion, perceive the loneliness behind the camouflage, and see the need behind the pretence and so be better able to help.

## The Good Shepherd



I expect some of you remember when there were lots more fields around Wareham, some of them used for grazing sheep. Or maybe you grew up in a big city, like I did, where there were no fields. My mother, born in 1913, would describe the area where we lived in South London as surrounded by fields when she was young, fields with sheep grazing.

We do not have to know much about farming to understand Jesus when he says 'I am the Good Shepherd' who would lay down his life for his sheep. In biblical times the sheep pen would have an opening and after the shepherd had got all the sheep in the pen, he would sit by the opening to protect his sheep from danger. If however the shepherd did not own the sheep, but was looking after them for others, Jesus says, he is likely to run away at any sign of danger. Jesus is the Good Shepherd and we are his sheep, his children, who he will sustain and protect, just because we are his. He even knows us by name because we are his and he watches over us and loves us.

Everything changes doesn't it? Fields disappear to make way for houses and other buildings or roads. As we grow older we find change more and more difficult. Maybe we lose friends or family, our bodies become more frail, so we can't do the things we used to do.

God is the good shepherd; he knows us all by name, he knows our joys and difficulties and he loves us for just being ourselves. We don't have to do anything or be anyone, because God accepts all of us. Whatever we have done or not done, God loves us. We are precious to God because we are his, his children and as St Paul said, 'nothing can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ.'
